His first job was a paper route which turned into three paper routes and by the time he was twelve years old he had saved up enough money to buy his first dirt bike. His passion for fast bikes and sports cars continued into adulthood. A natural daredevil, he had a strong sense of adventure leading him to climb the tallest of trees and reaching the highest speeds on his bicycle and then dirt bike while creating taller and taller ramps to catch the most air from! He spent his childhood exploring the mountains and nooks and crannies of the Seattle area and Wenatchee Valley with friends Jack and Burt and continued to develop his strong work ethic and ingenuity through various odd jobs.

David entered his 20's by welcoming his only child Tiffany Leanna Scott, whom he loved very much, never did she leave his thoughts and heart.

As a young man David placed the same determination and passion into his work as he did his adventures. The industrious side of him shined during his years with Boeing when he helped build one of the stealth bombers (B-2 Spirit of Washington). He was with the Laborers Union in the Seattle area and spent a rough season on a crabbing boat in Alaska's Dutch harbor. He was excellent with his hands and thought outside of the box.
