Eletha Margaret Elmer of East Wenatchee passed away at Colonial Vista Care at the age of 101 years. Eletha was born to Morris and Pansie (Cory) Storme in Anacortes, Washington and attended school there and graduated in 1930. Eletha earned a Bachelor's Degree from Western Washington University in Bellingham, Washington. She taught 1st through 6th Grade for one year in the one room Clockum School House. Eletha married Estel Elmer on December 23, 1933 where they made their home in Wenatchee and their three children were born. In 1953, they moved to East Wenatchee where they purchased an orchard and converted the acreage to an apple orchard. Then in 1975 built their home on the hill above the orchard and retired there.

Eletha was a member of the First United Methodist Church for 70 years and a 35-year Member of the Wenatchee Women's Club, serving two terms as Washington President. It was in the Art and Crafts Department that she became interested in "hand crafts" of many kinds, and made gifts for friends and family. She also was a Cub Scout and Camp Fire Girls Leader for many years.

Eletha is survived by her sons, Elden (Marty), Mervin and daughter Karren. Eletha has nine Grandchildren, 14 Great Grandchildren, and eight Great-Great Grandchildren and many nieces and nephews. She was preceded in death by her parents, husband; Estel (1989); brothers; Norman Storme (1936), Vern Storme (2014) and Don Storme (1989) and sister, Violet England (1996).
