James Palmer Scott, 57, a 10 year Tacoma area resident and former 28 year Wenatchee resident, died of accidental drowning while swimming near Gig Harbor on Monday, July 20, 2009

He was born on June 16, 1952 at Hot Springs, South Dakota. At the age of two, following an accident in which his mother died, he and his father moved to Chelan. He was later adopted by the Scott family in Chelan at a young age. In his early teen's he was taken in as a foster child by Lloyd and Ann McHargue and he lived in Shelton for four years in the lat 1960's.

James graduated from Eastmont High School in East Wenatchee in 1971. While in high school, he met his wife to be, Deborah Horner. They were married for 18 years and had two children together.

He went to work at ALCOA in Wenatchee and worked there for over 20 years before moving to Tacoma where he made his home. He has worked at the Concrete Technology Corporation in Tacoma for the past four years. He was a member of the Laborers International Union of North America, Local # 252.

James was a former member of the Freewill Baptist Church in East Wenatchee. He especially enjoyed fishing, hunting, canoeing, motorcycle riding and music.

He is survived by his daughter and son-in-law, Jenny & Jeremy Hoffert, Wenatchee; his son, Joshua Scott, Anchorage, AK; foster parents, Lloyd & Ann McHargue, Shelton; foster brother, Jeff McHargue, Olympia; foster sister, Tamy Wattum, Snohomish; two grandchildren, Jacob Scott, Portland, OR and

Haedyn Dean Hoffert, Wenatchee and one step-grandson, Nathan Seth Hoffert, Wenatchee.
