



Mildred Margaret Brown

October 25, 1925 - January 19, 2014

Mildred Margaret Brown, 88, a longtime Wenatchee resident, passed away on Sunday, January 19, 2014 at Central Washington Hospital.

She was born on October 25, 1925 at Oxford, Arkansas to the late Robert Buchanan and Ara (Vincent) White. Within a few months of her birth, they moved to Missouri where she was raised on her family's Dairy Farm.

While she was in high school in Missouri, she was the Star Center on what was the number two rated basketball team in the United States at the time.

She moved to Kansas City, Kansas at the beginning of World War II and went to work to support the war effort. She worked at the Pratt and Whitney Aircraft Company factory where she made airplane carburetors.

She moved to Wenatchee to assist her sister in 1946 and went to work for Cedergreen Foods. In 1949, she met Herman Bennington Brown and they were later married on September 13, 1950 in Wenatchee. She became a homemaker and later became a full time foster parent. She went to work at Lamb Weston in Quincy until retiring in 1991. After retiring, she moved to live with her daughter and son-in-law near Wanapum Dam on the Columbia River in Grant County. In the mid 1990's, they moved to make their home in Wenatchee.

She especially enjoyed her grandchildren and great-grandchildren as well as other people's children, grandchildren and great grandchildren.

She is survived by one son, Kelly L. Brown, Spokane; one daughter and son-in-law, Karen & Steve Brown, Wenatchee; five grandchildren, Andrew of

Portland, OR, Amanda and Michael both of Wenatchee, Matthew of Houston, TX and Sarah of Sacramento, CA and three great grandchildren, Stacy Ann Brown of Wenatchee, Sari and Isaac Brown both of Bridgeport. She was preceded in death by her husband, Herman; one sister, Gladys Gills and two brothers, Glen and Oral White.
